* DO YOU feel "dumb" about Dumbarton Oaks? A lot of good American citizens have an uneasy feeling that the Dumbarton Oaks conference is something they should know more about. For our Lions Club program on Monday, April 16, we will have S. R. Blackburn as a guest speaker to explain this conference and what it means to America. Then the following week we will have Miss Novma Mering, history teacher in the Great Bend high school, comment on the forthcoming San Francisco conference. Be sure to attend these two meetings, as it will aid you to keep posted on events that will long be an important part of history.

* MILLING industry of Great Bend means more than just employment and added business for the community, pointed out A. D. Creech, manager of one of Great Bend's three mills last Monday. While other communities are screaming for means to ship out grain, there has been a constant market for wheat in Great Bend. In fact grain has been trucked into this city for a hundred miles just to be able to find a ready market. Mr. Creech's company is now making "grits" or granular flour which is shipped out and in turn made into alcohol, used for synthetic rubber and ammunition. Creech passed out samples of the product. He also sounded a warning against the growing in Kansas of Red Chief and Chiefkan wheat which thus far has not made a satisfactory bakery flour. Unless a method of utilizing this wheat for bakeries, which normally supplies 90% of the market for wheat, can be developed, parts of the state which raise these kinds are due for loss of their market.
